Northampton has been traversed by main lines since the nineteenth century and one of the most notable feats of engineering in the area of Roade Cutting.



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"Cutting Remarks" is a very comprehensive and interesting history of how the cutting was built and the impact it and the railway had on the population of Roade over a period from the 1830s to the present day. The early years were dominated by the construction as part of the new London to Birmingham Railway and the resulting Navvy invasion. This book deals with many incidents that occurred involving the navvies whose hard working and hard living style of life conflicted with that of the villagers. It provides a timely contrast with the construction today of the HS2 line not so very far away, although I feel sure Brackley will not suffer the same way as Roade did!

Many interesting facts are highlighted such as the one about the aqueduct in the cutting being a listed building and this and others are backed up by photos. Perhaps the most amazing of all was the air race in 1910 that wound see Roade become prominent in national and international headlines with the railway cutting playing its part.

The more modern period is covered with nostalgic pictures of Roade Station before it was closed in 1964 and there are even details of where the now By-pass will cross the cutting.

There is also plenty on Roade's other railway and cutting, the Stratford-upon-Avon and Midland Junction Railway nickname "The Scratter" which ran from east to west and has long gone but has left its mark.

The book is well illustrated with colour and black and white photographs and is a bargain at the price.
